How was propaganda used to influence the civilian population during WWI?

| Approx 40m | Students work in pairs, with one image from the Dictionary of Sydney per pair. Students complete a source analysis, using the worksheet to guide them. Students are then asked to produce a WWI propaganda poster of their own.
